Required Supplies for Spanish:

your SCPA planner

Summer Work:

- 1. Your first assignment is to sign up for Remind. This will allow you to receive communication from me throughout the summer. Text @milprofe8 to the number 81010. Once you have done this you will have the ability to ask me questions, if you have them, through Remind. Also, there is a Remind app that most students find helpful that you can download if you want. Please note that some form of successful communication with me is required, so if Remind doesn't work for you or you don't want to use it, you need to email me to work out an alternative.
- 2. Create an account on DuoLingo (duolingo.com) and join my class. (Logging in with Google or FB does NOT create an account.) Test it out. To join my class, use this class code: J C G Z B Z (Make sure it's a class and not a club). OR
 - o If on a computer, click the blue "Don't have a classroom code?"
 - o Enter my email: sunderwood@scpa.org and then pick: Spanish 1.
 - Write down your login information so you will remember it. (There is an app, but write it down anyway.)
 - Test it out by practicing and unlocking skills. If you have no previous experience with Spanish, I recommend starting with *Introduction, Common Phrases*, and/or *Greetings*. If you have prior experience or are entering Spanish 2 or above, practice whatever you need to review—something not too easy but not too challenging.
- 3. If you've had Spanish before—keep practicing it! Keep an easy-to-maintain log of what you do (could just be notes in your phone). Practice could include watching movies you know in Spanish, streaming a Spanish show on Netflix (some are more appropriate than others), talking to someone that speaks Spanish, listening to Spanish music, practicing lyricstraining.com or almost anything else you can think of where

you are trying to understand Spanish with some success.
